

ANZCCJ Internship FAQs:

1. What level of Japanese/English language ability should I have?

As office operations are conducted primarily in English, it is expected that interns have a high-level of English language skills, particularly in reading and writing. Ideally, Japanese interns with TOEFL (can you spell this acronym out) or other certified English qualifications will be prioritised over other applicants. Likewise, Australian or New Zealand applicants with intermediate to advanced Japanese abilities are given priority over other applicants.

2. Can ANZCCJ provide me with a visa for my internship?

Unfortunately, ANZCCJ does not provide interns with Visa certification or paperwork because of the resources required to do so. It is instead up to the intern to organise their own visa. Because it is an unpaid internship, a holiday visa will suffice.

3. Are ANZCCJ's internships paid?

Interning at ANZCCJ is on a volunteer basis, and is not paid. However, travel costs to and from the office will be reimbursed.

4. Can anyone apply to ANZCCJ?

Interns from Australia, New Zealand and Japan are encouraged to apply. Other nationalities will be considered, but where applicants have a particular affinity or connection.

5. How many internship places are there?

The maximum number of intern spots we have available at any one time is two, due to office space. However, applications are open all year round, so please apply with some flexibility in time frames (and work hours).

6. Can I attend university or other work commitments whilst undertaking the internship?

ANZCCJ offers flexible full-time and part-time internships, and we understand that other commitments can conflict with timing. If you're unsure of whether your schedule can work with ANZCCJ's, email us for more information. Ideally candidates will be available to attend some evening events.
